On This Week's Torah Portion – Re'eh

The people of Israel are preparing to occupy the Land. This adventure is a new chapter in their sacred mission. A few central questions for consideration in the Book of Devarim are: What type of direction, instruction, or imperatives should Moses give to them?; Can we view this parsha and several others as Moses conveying G-d's deep attachment to the people of Israel and concern for their future?; and How are Moses and G-d giving them a spiritual basis to sustain them in the Land?

In the three parashot Reeh, Shoftim and Ki Seitzei Moses mentions the vast majority of the mitzvos that the Jewish people will need in the Land of Israel. Parshas Reeh explains to the people that the observances in the wilderness will not be sufficient for the new life in the Land of Israel where the people will have to take more responsibility for everyday life. In these parashot, Moses informs us about how G-d commanded the mitzvot and provided details concerning how the laws were to be obeyed. In the Book of Devarim, Samson Raphael Hirsch says: "Of the more than 100 articles of law more than seventy are new and do not appear in preceding books." (Pentateuch, p. 653). G-d has placed in the hands of the people to choose their future. They can follow the laws and be blessed or be cursed if they turn away from them.

Rav Kook, who was heavily invested in the holiness of the Land of Israel, was able to embrace even the least religious halutzim (pioneers) because he understood that settling the land spoke to a spiritual yearning in them that the forms of religion in the places they had left could not. The Torah must give the people a formal religion that can give them a sense of identity as opposed to the surrounding nations and remind them of the importance of the Almighty without their falling into complacency that either the observances or being everyday good people can substitute for each other. Part of how this is done is instituting a formal central place where the Shechina is and formal times where everybody has to show up and bring some token individual sacrifice even if it is only a bird.

Festivals are brought into a different meaning when the people of Israel enter the land. The festivals serve as a deadline to bring any of the individual non-festival offerings such as the elevation offering, sin offering, or vow that people have become obligated to bring. Festivals are also a reenactment of the range of emotions of the Exodus experience from joy at freedom. At Passover, there is joy at everything you have which will sustain you through the winter and possible shmitta year on Sukkos. This parsha contains the specific commandment to rejoice on the three pilgrimage festivals as opposed to the later threat of dire punishment for NOT serving G-d with joy. This suggests that rejoicing on the festival is more than bringing joy to preparing for the festival and whatever mitzvos you may do there, but also involves rejoicing in the timeless power of the recalled spiritual experience and the relative lack of everyday spiritual impediments. In our discussion about this parsha, James Borden, shlita, emphasized that the community needs to bend over backward to support a poor or sick person in getting to Jerusalem to participate in the festival as is supported by the text which says that Levites, gerim, widows, and orphans should all participate.

These places and times give the people the opportunity to test their level of spiritual intensity and generosity when it is challenged to be at a very high level. In their everyday lives outside the Temple Mount, the people should be scrupulous about the laws of kashrut which are mentioned here. This behavior accustoms the people to think that the world/Israel is here for us to enjoy if we are able to make distinctions between what is spiritually nourishing and what isn't.
